



It's too hard to get a job and there are not many out there.

A job in arts and entertainment does not pay well.

My art isn't good enough to become an independent worker.

Truth

According to the <u>Bureau of Labor</u>
<u>Statistics</u> there is a projected 4% growth in job opportunities
nationwide between 2022-2034

As of 2022 the mean annual wage for occupations in the arts, design, entertainment,, sports and media occupations in the San Diego-Carlsbad metropolitan area was over around \$78,000 (BLS)

There are plenty of occupations that revolve around art and creativity that don't require you to be a "great" artist. Consider these jobs:

- Art educator/instructor
- Working at an art gallery
- Graphic design/marketing

Occupations that only require an Associate's Degree:

- Creative assistant
- Social media manager
- Industrial designer
- Interior designer
- Land architect

Consider some of the benefits of working in the creative/fine arts field:

- Art careers often offer flexible schedules
- Visual artist usually charge by the piece, not by hour. This means that you may not even need to work full time once you start mastering your craft and are able to sustain a living off of a piece or two a month
- Art presents itself in many mediums, so there is room to explore the different possibilities



Using Credible Sources and Addressing Misinformation

The internet has a lot of information, but not all of it is accurate. That's why it's important to check if the sources are trustworthy. Using reliable sources is key to being a credible resource for your schoolwork or projects.

Online information might not always be true! Ask yourself these questions:

Does the information come from a newspaper, magazine, or website you've never heard of?

Is just one newspaper, magazine, or website reporting on the story? Is the story missing key information?

Can you find the original source of the info?

Is this information peer reviewed?

Misinformation refers to false or inaccurate information, often spread unintentionally through rumors, insults, or pranks.

Disinformation, on the other hand, is more sneaky and harmful. It's when people purposely share fake stories to manipulate others or cause trouble. It's like spreading rumors to create fear or confusion.

Is my source credible?

The source is in-depth, containing more than a few pages, an abstract, a reference list, and documented research or data.

The source is reputable, published in a peer-reviewed scholarly journal or on a reputable, non-biased website. The authors are experts, known for their work in the field, and have written about similar topics before.

The source is reputable, published in a peer-reviewed scholarly journal or on a reputable, non-biased website.

The purpose of the source is to provide information or report original research or experiments.

The Five Ws

WHO provides the information?

WHAT information are the authors presenting? What makes it reliable?

WHEN was the information published?

WHERE did you find the information? Where could you apply it?

WHY are the authors sharing this information?





Trolley stop too far?

For rides to the closest trolley station, or for smaller commutes around town, find your local bus route that services your neighborhood at https://www.sdmts.com/transit-services/bus-routes

The GREEN line begins downtown and travels northeast, passing through Mission Valley, SDSU and ends in Santee.

The ORANGE line also begins downtown and travels east and north through La Mesa and El Cajon.

The BLUE line travels north from San Ysidro to La Jolla, and includes stops in Chula Vista, Downtown San Diego (great for baseball season!) Kearny Mesa and UCSD.

WHY SHOULD WE VOLUNTEER

Volunteering offers many benefits. It fosters a sense of belonging and connection among members, encouraging increased social interaction and engagement while creating a welcoming atmosphere.



Additionally, a close-knit community provides a valuable source of information and support.

VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITIES IN SAN DIEGO



Assist refugee children in City Heights with English and math tutoring on Tuesday and Thursday evenings. English-fluent volunteers commit to tutoring once a week for the school year. No formal training needed.



This organization collaborates with local businesses to gather surplus food for 400,000 food-insecure San Diegans. Volunteers help sort and box food, and handle administrative tasks. Group volunteering is welcomed for team-building or family activities.



Home Start combats child abuse and aids San Diego families in need. Volunteers assist with administration, childcare, psychological support, domestic violence advocacy, and offer free tax filing help during tax season.



Mama's Kitchen, a volunteer-driven non-profit, delivers nutritious meals to San Diegans battling cancer, AIDS, or critical illnesses. Volunteers help with meal delivery, kitchen tasks, front desk duties, pantry support, and participate in food drives and events.



For 45+ years, ElderHelp aids seniors in staying independent at home. Volunteers offer home visits, shopping assistance, safety inspections, outings, mail organization, and more. The organization also provides transportation and caregiver education.


>>> SUSTAINABILITY
