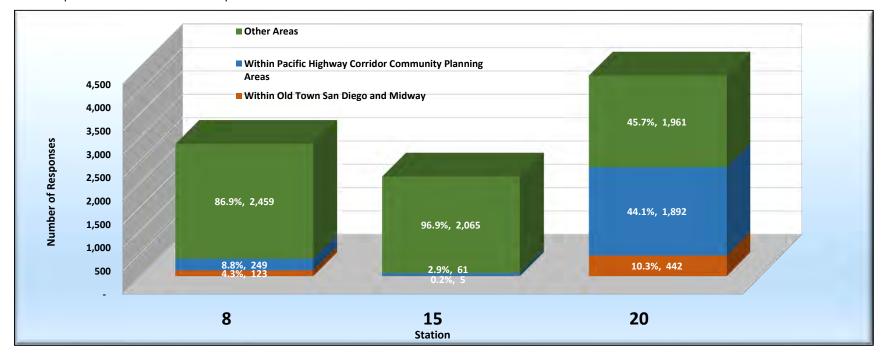

Dear Ms. Morrison:

We are in receipt of your May 5, 2017 request for potential student generation information for updates to the OLD TOWN SAN DIEGO COMMUNITY PLAN. The number of potential future additional housing units has been determined for the Plan Area. In this letter we address your questions and provide requested information.

Existing number of units and future additional housing units

From information provided by the requestor, the number of existing housing units (source: SANDAG Series 13 forecast base year) and the number of future additional housing units (source: City of San Diego estimates of future buildout) in the Community Plan Area (CPA) is noted in Table 1. Single family may include both detached and multiple unit (attached) types.

District student generation rates

Student generation rates vary based on the type of project, number of units, bedroom mix, affordable or senior housing components, proximity to schools and other amenities, neighborhood, and other factors. There are not district standard or school-specific rates.

Typically, to provide student generation rates for a new residential development, we research similar nearby developments and their student generation rates, as a guide for how many students the new development may generate. This request, however, is not for a specific project, but rather for a potential increase in total housing stock in a specific CPA at a future point in time. Many factors are not yet determined, such as the specific type of housing and bedroom mix that may be constructed.

Therefore, our best strategy to estimate the number of students potentially generated by future buildout of the OLD TOWN SAN DIEGO COMMUNITY PLAN AREA is to reference the number of existing housing units in the CPA, and the current number of students who reside in the CPA (based on San Diego Unified School District data), to determine current student generation rates. Single family may include both detached and multiple unit (attached) types.

Based on the information in Tables 1 and 2, potential student generation for future buildout of the OLD TOWN SAN DIEGO COMMUNITY PLAN AREA is shown in Table 3. The current rate is the low range and the high range is double the low range.

The number of single family homes is proposed to decline by 71 (to 80, down from 151) by the Community Plan update, while the number of multi family homes is proposed to increase by 1,002 (to 1,325, up from 323). This is a total net increase of 931 units (to 1,405, up from 474).

A key assumption is that future additional housing units will generate students at a rate similar to current housing units; this is represented by the low range. If future additional housing units are significantly different from current units in terms of student generation, the number of students could be higher, as indicated by the high range.

The potential increase in students from the number of future additional housing units suggested in the Community Plan update could impact district facilities to the point of reaching capacity, particularly at Grant K-8 school. Measures such as reduction of non-resident students at the local schools would be undertaken to ensure space is available for future resident growth. In addition, the district has a closed

school site, Fremont Elementary, within the Old Town area that is currently used for administrative functions. Fremont could possibly be re-opened as a school if needed.

Please keep us apprised of revisions to development plans as new information may result in changes to the information stated in this letter. Thank you.

Listed below are the Police Department's findings for the Old Town Community Project No. 561630.

Area Station

Police service for the Old Town Community Project will be provided by officers from Western Division located at 5215 Gaines Street in the City of San Diego. The service area for the project is Beat 625. Western Division provides police services to the following communities: Linda Vista, Morena, Mission Valley West, University Heights, North Park, Burlingame, Hillcrest, Midtown, Mission Hills, Midway District, Loma Portal, Point Loma Heights, Ocean Beach, Sunset Cliffs, Roseville/Fleet Ridge, La Playa and Wooded Area.

The San Diego Police Department has mutual aid agreements with all other Law Enforcement Agencies in San Diego County.

Current Staffing / Officer Availability

Western Division is currently staffed with 81 sworn personnel and two civilian employees. Officers work tenhour shifts. Staffing is comprised of three shifts which operate from 6:00 a.m. - 4:00 p.m. (First Watch), 2:00 p.m. - Midnight (Second Watch) and from 9:00 p.m. - 7:00 a.m. (Third Watch). Using the Department's recommended staffing guidelines, Western Division strives to deploy a minimum of 14 patrol officers on First Watch, 16 patrol officers on Second Watch, and 13 patrol officers on Third Watch.

The San Diego Police Department does not staff individual stations based on ratios of sworn officers per 1,000 population ratio. The goal citywide is to maintain 1.48 officers per 1,000 population ratio.

Current Response Times

Old Town Community Project is currently located in the City of San Diego; within the boundaries of police beat 625. The 2016 average response times for Beat 625 are 6.2 minutes for emergency calls, 13.2 minutes for

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priority one calls, 36.4 minutes for priority two calls, 113.5 minutes for priority three calls and 106 minutes for priority four calls.

The San Diego Police Department's Citywide response time goals are 7 minutes for emergency calls, 12 minutes for priority one calls, 25 minutes for priority two calls, 60 minutes for priority three calls and 70 minutes for priority four calls. The citywide average response times, for the same period, were 7 minutes for emergency calls, 16 minutes for priority one calls, 42.5 minutes for priority two calls, 100.9 minutes for priority three calls and 150.6 minutes for priority four calls during that same time period. The Department strives to maintain the response time goals as one of various other measures used to assess the level of service to the community.

Potential Mitigation Measures to Response Time

The Department is currently reaching a staffing ratio of 1.3 sworn officers per 1,000 residents based on 2016 estimate residential population of 1,391,676. The ratio is calculated to take into account all support and investigative positions within the Department. This ratio does not include the significant population increase resulting from citizens who commute to work from outside of the city of San Diego or those visiting.

Legacy International Plan Update

There are no current plans for additional police sub-stations in the immediate area. Police response times in this community will continue to increase with the build-out of community plans and the increase of traffic generated by new growth. A Crime Prevention through Environmental Design (CPTED) review is recommended by the Department to address general security concerns.
