

Stop Using Compostable Products!

Compostable products such as containers, utensils, plates and bowls are made out of corn, potatoes.



However, in the City's Greenery Program they do not biodegrade into compost and eventually end up creating methane gas in the Miramar Landfill. Also, if they are mixed with other recyclables in

the blue bin, they can contaminate the quality of plastics when they are made into new products. So please place all compostable products in the black trash bin and use reusable plates, cups and silverware whenever possible.

Bring Your Own Bag San Diego


San Diego residents use an average of 500 single-use plastic bags every year and most bags are used for an average of only 12 minutes. These bags can become litter; get buried in the landfill; or eaten by wildlife. To help



reduce single-use plastic bag waste, the State of California passed a new law (Senate Bill 270) that will require all large grocery stores and pharmacies to discontinue the distribution of single-use plastic bags starting July 1, 2015. Get ahead of the new law and start bringing your own reusable bag today. ESD is also giving away reusable bags at community events and on its social media pages. New Addition to Curbside Recycling

Starting December 26, 2014 the City will be accepting StyrofoamTM block packaging in its blue curbside recycling bins. StyrofoamTM blocks and forms are commonly used to protect electronics, appliances and furniture during shipping. Please note, no packing peanuts, plates, cups or containers.

Zero Waste is reducing, reusing and recycling the resources you use so that there's no trash. The City has been working with residents, businesses, non-profits and others to develop a Zero Waste Plan. The goals are **75% waste diversion by 2020** and **Zero Waste by 2040**. Replacing Trash and Recycling Containers

Automated trash and recycling containers are made of a strong polyethylene plastic. They are anticipated to last for 10 years. Your containers may be at the end of their useful lives and may begin developing cracks or holes. Black trash containers may be replaced through the Environmental Services Department for a fee of \$70 or you may purchase a similar container at a home improvement store. Blue recycling bins are currently replaced at no charge. Delivery is available for an additional \$25 fee per container.
