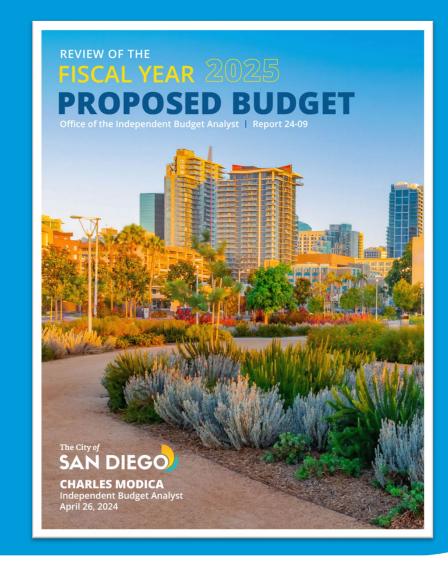

## Overview

## Mayor, IBA, and Council Roles

- Mayor releases a Proposed Budget that is balanced and carries out the City's goals, policies, programs, and services
- IBA thoroughly analyzes Proposed Budget
- Council reviews budget and holds hearings and public town halls
  - Budget Review Committee hearings offer opportunity for department presentations and public input
- Charter vests budget authority for finalizing the FY 2025 budget in the hands of Council



## Overview

# **Key Findings**

- Difficult budget year was anticipated
- Programmatic additions are limited and reductions are proposed, many of which were prior-year additions to address inequities
- Significant structural budget imbalance remains, as ongoing expenses/services expanded during the use of one-time ARPA funds
- To close the deficit, FY 2025 relies on mitigation efforts both in FY 2024 and FY 2025 and projected FY2024 Excess Equity
- New revenue or far deeper cuts will be needed for FY 2026
- To assist Council with budget modifications, compiled major additions, mitigations, and modification options

## Economic Outlook and General Fund Revenues

## **Property Tax**

- Growth in Major General Fund Revenues driven by property taxes (\$48.8M)
- Assumes lower growth rate than FY 2024 due to lower sales volumes and slower growth in median home price

## Sales Tax and Transient Occupancy Tax

- Sales tax projected to come in \$9.0M <u>below</u> FY 24 Adopted Budget
- TOT projected to come in very slightly (\$1.3M) <u>above</u> FY 24 Adopted Budget
- Both sales tax and TOT experienced lower-than projected receipts in first half of FY 2024

#### Franchise Fees

 Increase of \$13.4M driven by: assumed increases in SDG&E rates, addition of Sycamore Facility franchise fees, and waiver of contribution to Energy Independence Fund

# Key Budget Issues

## **Climate Action Plan**

- Proposed Budget includes \$761M; 97% in CIP, primarily Pure Water
  - \$201M for direct support; potential funding gap of \$188M, primarily for stormwater
- CAP-related funds not fully funded
  - Unfunded Climate Equity Fund (\$8.5M), Energy Independence Fund (\$5.8M including swept fund balance)

# **Departmental Vacancies**

- Progress in addressing persistent high vacancy issues in recent years
- However, Request to Fill Process could increase vacancy rates as only critical positions can be filled with approval

# Key Budget Issues Equity

- \$18.7M in notable equity investments
  - \$9.0M citywide DIF for infrastructure in Communities of Concern
  - \$7.6M new homelessness programs
- \$36.5M in reductions
  - \$15.0M withheld from Housing Commission
  - \$8.5M Climate Equity Fund waiver
  - \$5.8M Bridge to Home waiver
  - \$3.1M elimination of Community Equity Fund
  - \$3.1M elimination of programs: FY 24 youth drop-in, After School and Teen Center Programs, Immigrant Affairs Office, Cannabis Social Equity program, No Shots Fired
  - \$960,000 in other reductions, including \$57,000 for SD Access for All

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# Key Budget Issues

# **Infrastructure Funding Needs**

- Budget mitigations from the CIP totaling \$53M help support operating budget, therefore bond financing heavily relied upon
- City has been appropriating future bond financing to projects but \$652M in projects await financing, as proposed
- IBA concerns about earmarking debt proceeds this far in advance



# Key Budget Issues

# **Homelessness and Housing**

- Increases: \$9.7M to backfill grant funding and \$7.6M for new safe parking, 1,000 shelter beds, and expanded family shelter
- Decreases: \$15M for Housing Commission (implementation unclear); \$952,000 for PEER, outreach, storage, Interim shelter

### **Pension**

- Pension costs make up 16.5% of General Fund expenditures
- Increases from prior year largely due to higher salaries and changes in how the pension is calculated

# Next Steps/Conclusion

## **Overall Thoughts**

- Mayor's Proposed Budget is balanced overall
  - Balanced with the use of \$198M in one-time funding for ongoing services & programs
- Since ARPA funds were exhausted, the City is now left to rely on growth of existing revenues, but structural budget deficit remains
- City is currently considering two revenue measures on the November 2024 ballot that are necessary to support existing services and/or expand services
- Without new revenue, far deeper cuts will be needed in FY 2026 and beyond



# Next Steps/Conclusion

- Council now has opportunity to review and revise the Proposed Budget
  - Revisions can be made, but budget must remain balanced
- Timeline:
  - May 1-7 Budget Review Committee Hearings
  - May 1, 8 Evening Hearings to receive June 7 BRC discusses the further public input
  - May 16 May Revision and 3<sup>rd</sup> Quarter June 11 Council makes final budget Report to be heard in consideration of decisions and takes action on final budget decisions
  - May 22 Councilmembers issue final budget modification priority memos

- June 4 IBA issues final recommended revisions
- recommended budget revisions
- FY 2025 budget revisions
- June 25 Council Adopts FY 2025 Appropriation Ordinance
