Meeting Notes:

Welcome, Introductions, and Agenda Review:

- Roosevelt William III (Community Development Specialist II, Economic Development Department) welcomed attendees to the FY25 calendar's first meeting and introduced Domanic Riley, the new Grants and Research VISTA.
 - o Domanic Riley shared his background as a former Air Force mechanic, SDSU political science graduate, and his goal to support the Economic Activity Working
- Roosevelt introduced co-chairs Danielle Stephen (National University) and Sylvia Ramirez (City Heights CDC), and emphasized the Promise Zone's mission to foster opportunity, address systemic inequities, and improve residents' quality of life.
- Sylvia Ramirez presented the agenda, focusing on demographic and economic activity data review, and the transition to a new logic model as a tool to track progress toward

Promise Zone Updates:

- During the summer working group interim, the Promise Zone hosted three events:
 - o Barrio Logan Business Walk on June 27.
 - o Inclusive Public Engagement on July 11.
 - Co-operative Convening II on July 31.
- The Promise Zone team also expanded over the interim with the introduction of new VISTAS Donika Moreno, Bex Nava-Mcclellan, and Domanic Riley. They also added a new Employ and Empower Intern, Brandon Tran.
- A new schedule was presented for all working group meetings going forward. For Economic Activity, all meeting will be held on the 3rd Thursday of every month.
- This month's Community Spotlight was **Clovis Honoré of GRID Alternatives**. Mr. Honoré has been involved with multiple social advocacy groups over the years and remains a pillar in the San Diego non-profit community. As a member of GRID



- Alternatives, he has sought to increase funding for green initiatives through advocating for people to invest in them.
- The Promise Zone team indicated that they would like to hear ideas for future nominees that community members feel deserve a spotlight for all they've done to improve the well-being of those who live in the Promise Zone.

Presentation: Economic Activity Data:

- Amber Weber reviewed relevant data to the Promise Zone, including a GIS map tool and census data collected by VISTA Ian Hembree from 2016 to 2022. The big takeaways were:
 - o Median age is lower in Promise Zone than San Diego proper.
 - Average number of people in Promise Zone household is 3+ in comparison to the 2+ that is typical across the rest of San Diego.
 - Between 2016 and now: Increase in those belonging to two or more races and a decrease in the population of those who see themselves as being primarily Hispanic.
 - Household income has increased (possibly due to minimum wage hike); Poverty rate in Promise Zone fell from 35% to 20%.
 - Between 2010 2019, 1,055 businesses were created in the Promise Zone. In comparison, between 2020 - 2023, 1,024 new businesses were created. This is a dramatic increase when you consider that only 431 new businesses were created in the 2000 - 2009 timeframe.
 - There is a 2:1 ratio of brick-and-mortar to home-based businesses in the 92113area code. Notably, there are 1,018 brick-and-mortar businesses to 524 homebased businesses.
 - The majority of businesses in the Promise Zone fall into the categories of:
 - Other Services 642
 - Retail Trades 516
 - Support, Waste Mgmt., and Remediation Services 456
- Questions posed during the presentation:
 - John Tucker, PEP: How does cost of living impact quality of life? Businesses require more initial funding to start up as \$10,000 is no longer sufficient to cover initial operating expenses and salaries. More research will be necessary to see how rising costs of living impact the founding of new businesses.
 - Rose Marks-Patton, Live Well San Diego: Do the actual addresses of the businesses coincide with the physical location where they conduct business? A deeper dive into the data may be required beyond the publicly available tax data.

Economic Activity Logic Model Breakout Groups:



Danielle introduced the new logic model framework, highlighting the group's objective to increase access to capital, and how that has been affected by inconsistent partner attendance. With the new logic model and its straightforward inputs, outputs, and measurable outcomes, it's hoped that the group will be able to better clarify how it will reach its goals. Breakout sessions were held to discuss and refine this new framework.

Group 1: Strengthen the Business Base and Attract New Businesses to Vacant Land (<u>View Objective 1 Logic Model</u>)

Main Topics of Conversation

- Reviewed existing activities, such as walkability and accessibility of transportation for potential business customers, providing support to Diamond BID (completed), pursuing a Buy Local campaign with SD Made, following up on Livewell's Virtual Connection Hub, aligning our tactics with the City of San Diego Economic Development Department's Strategy Update.
- Discussed how affordable housing/rent control can promote stability among the Promise Zone's primary economic base, its long-term residents.
- o Discussed how to incorporate safety into its existing objective:
 - Reviewed goals on logic model to see which ones could best be refocused towards promoting business, customer, or investor safety.
 - William Burties felt that safety could be promoted through other means, such as by holding events (performances, vendor markets, food markets) that increase economic activity and foot traffic in areas of the Promise Zone that were more susceptible to petty crime, such as vacant land. The hope is that the increased deterrence effect of groups of people actively engaged in the community would be enough to create an atmosphere of safety in the Promise Zone.
- Discussed using shuttle service to promote business traffic and safety for both on-foot and vehicle-based customers, such as the Way Outside the Lines trolley event and Chicano Park Museum's Via Verde shuttle.
- Discussed working with Logan Heights CDC to help street vendors with licensing since they already hold similar events that assist with business licensing.

Group 2: Support Small Businesses, Entrepreneurs, and Self-Employed Residents (<u>View Objective 2 Logic Model</u>)

• Main Topics of Conversation

- o Discussed displacement and how group can help prevent it.
- Discussed examples of predatory lending in the Promise Zone.



- John Tucker brought up an example of a restaurant that needed equipment, but the loan granted to them by a major financial institution had a 43% daily interest rate. Owner didn't realize this until 1-2 years later.
- Is there was a way to regulate or incentivize small businesses to look at 2-plus lending institutions and would the City be able to help?
 - Viridiana replied that they could possibly work with the City Treasurer, connect them to Accessity, LISC, etc, or refer them to Catalyst's access to capital matrix. Link to Matrix: PowerPoint Presentation (catalystsd.org)
 - Zachary brought up Cal Coast and their new branch in the Promise Zone.
 Thought with a physical location they could provide real-time financial assistance/advice to Promise Zone businesses.
 - Roosevelt brought up the possibility of grading lenders in a similar manner to food safety or BBB ratings.
- John stated he would love to discuss this in more detail, and perhaps it would be
 possible to create a coalition of San Diego CDCs to update Catalyst's matrix. If
 the group provided educational packets to business owners, they could put them
 in touch with positive service providers.
- Danielle posed the possibility of a youth financial wellness assembly to help break the cycle of debt that traps many people and prevents them from improving their economic situation.

Breakout Room Discussion Review in Large Group:

- Group 1 explained how they would like to incorporate safety into their objective by holding events on vacant land to prevent crime. They also discussed incorporating EDS Objectives on increasing marketing to promote safety and how to make the Promise Zone a vibrant location for potential tourists.
- Group 2 focused on financial safety and more importantly predatory lending and how to prevent it, whether the City can regulate lenders, and efforts they can take to promote financial literacy and financial wellness among the residents of the Promise Zone.
