Jobs and Education

The working group met on Sept. 19 to discuss strategies for improving job opportunities and educational outcomes in the Promise Zone.

Lincoln High School and Sherman Elementary School presented updates on their ongoing efforts as a community school and shared ways the working group can provide support. On Oct. 17, we look forward to hearing from co-chairs Sarah Tuakli Cooper and Raquel Aparicio about the purpose, intention, and action steps moving forward with the logic models. Economic Activity

The September Economic Activity meeting was focused on identifying resources available to small business owners at the local level. Sean Karafin and Alex Southard from the City of San Diego's Economic Development Department presented on the programs and grants available to assist small business owners. Leonardo Ortiz of Logan Heights CDC explained how they partner with the Port of San Diego to assist vendors with attaining business licenses. Discussion going forward will be on how Economic Activity members can better promote these programs to small business owners in the communities they work in. Healthy Communities

The working group met on Thursday, Sept. 12, to continue advancing the objectives of promoting access to healthy foods and supporting opportunities for active transportation and active living. Coordinator John Ide from the City's Urban Forestry Program gave an update on the urban canopy cover in the Promise Zone and the 816 trees they have planted in San Diego under the Trees For Communities program. Joseph Kendrick from San Diego Hunger Coalition also presented data on nutrition insecurity and the Meal Gap in SDPZ and discussed how we can tackle it. In October, Diane Moss from Project New Village and Paola Boylan from the City's Planning Department will discuss their various initiatives. The Housing Affordability working group met on Sept. 5 for the first meeting of the new fiscal year. The group shared announcements, reviewed Promise Zone demographic and housing affordability data, and utilized the new logic model format of the tactical plan to advance the goal of housing affordability in the Promise Zone. COMMUNITY SPOTLIGHT: DANIELA KELLY



In 2024, the Sherman Heights Community Center will mark its 30th anniversary, celebrating decades of grassroots service and community building. The festivities begin on October 10, and the center's Executive Director is thrilled about the milestone. "We're kicking off our 30th anniversary with our beloved Noche de Mole event. It's a magical tradition that attracts thousands of people each year," said Daniela Kelly.

The center is making strides toward sustainability by going solar in 2024. "We're excited to install solar panels and a battery system, which will help us become a more environmentally aware organization," the she shared. This green initiative is just one way the center is evolving to meet the needs of the community.

A new and exciting addition for 2024 is the Cocina Program, a 16-week course designed for aspiring food entrepreneurs. "We're offering two sessions next year, teaching best kitchen practices, bread-making, catering, and more. Participants will also go on field trips around the county and gain certifications to support their business ventures," said Daniella Kelly.

Looking ahead to this fall, the center is gearing up for its annual Día de los Muertos celebration, which has grown to include the surrounding communities. "This event is not just for Sherman Heights, but for the entire community to come together in remembrance and celebration," the director explained.

Daniela, who has served as the Executive Director for four years, encourages residents to get involved, whether as volunteers, instructors, or participants in the various programs offered throughout the year. "We're always looking to involve local residents in our programs. Please, get involved!"

With its vibrant programming and forward-thinking initiatives, the Sherman Heights Community Center remains a beacon of service, education, and culture for the entire neighborhood. Don't miss out on the upcoming events and opportunities to engage with this thriving community hub!

NONPROFIT FUNDING OPPORTUNITY

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT GRANT

The Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) is a U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Entitlement Grant that the City receives to develop viable urban communities by providing decent housing and a suitable living environment, and by expanding economic opportunities, principally for low- and moderate-income persons. The City of San Diego Economic Development Department administers these funds to support projects and programs that serve City of San Diego communities. Interested nonprofit organizations can apply for this funding via the CDBG Annual NOFA process.

The NOFA consists of two phases: the Request for Qualifications (RFQ) phase and the Request for Proposals (RFP) phase.

Individuals may add their name and contact information to the CDBG email distribution list to receive up-to-date information about the Annual NOFA and other related programs.

The University of California San Diego (UCSD), in partnership with local agencies are leading a Community Health Worker (CHW) training program to develop capacity in Native American/Indigenous communities and Refugee and Immigrant communities, particularly but not exclusively from Africa, the Middle East and Southeast Asia.



GRANT OPPORTUNITIES

Community Enhancement Program

The Community Enhancement Program funds grants for cultural activities, museums, visitor and convention bureaus, economic development councils, and other similar institutions at the regional and community levels throughout San Diego County. 

The temporary installation provides voters another outlet to securely drop off their ballots. The ballot drop box at City Hall, and other ballot drop boxes around San Diego County, are open to voting beginning October 8. SAN DIEGO PROMISE ZONE

OVERVIEW



In 2016, the San Diego Promise Zone became one of 22 federally designated Promise Zones in the United States and one of only four in California. The San Diego Promise Zone covers a 6.4-square-mile targeted area with more than 80,000 residents that spans East Village and Barrio Logan east to Encanto. It is home to the City's most culturally rich and ethnically diverse neighborhoods, but also some of the most under-resourced communities.

Through the <u>Promise Zone initiative</u>, community-based organizations, direct service providers, residents, and business owners work with government agencies to enhance collective impact, streamline resources, and deliver comprehensive support.

Between 2016 and 2021, the unemployment rate decreased from 14.9% to 6.7%, and the poverty rate fell from 38.3% to 22.1% (ACS, 2016-21). We recognize there are many factors that contribute to these numbers. We do know that in the 8 years since the designation, targeted efforts from the city and CBOs have supported improvement in these areas; However, we recognize there is still plenty of work to do to continue advocating for our Promise Zone residents.
