Community Spotlight: John Tucker

John Tucker, Program Manager at the Partnership for Environmental Progress (PEP), brings a wealth of global experience and a deep commitment to community development. Having lived and worked in Spain, Portugal, Africa, Brazil, Argentina, and Australia, John's journey with nonprofits began early, volunteering in high school. His international experience gave him valuable insights into how nonprofits operate in diverse environments, shaping his approach to supporting businesses and nonprofits in San Diego's Promise Zone.



At PEP, John leads the **Partners for Economic Prosperity** campaign, which provides personalized support to business owners and nonprofit leaders. His mission is clear: to help individuals overcome challenges, get on their feet, and grow their businesses or careers. With a background in counseling, John understands the psychological and emotional obstacles many face. His expertise enables him to coach business owners through self-doubt and offer solutions for moving forward.

One of the core challenges John addresses is access to funding. Many of his clients do not qualify for traditional loans, so his team works to secure funding with favorable terms, empowering business owners to expand operations. For small businesses ready to grow but struggling with time or resources, PEP steps in with coaching, financial literacy training, and tailored plans for scaling.

John has supported various businesses in the Promise Zone, from landscaping to manufacturing, helping them evolve from small startups to thriving enterprises. He recognizes the cultural nuances of entrepreneurship, especially for individuals from diverse backgrounds, and helps bridge gaps between traditional practices and the American business landscape.

John's message to the community is one of hope and encouragement: "There is always a path forward. No matter your situation or challenges, there are resources and support available to help you succeed."





WE'RE BUILDING AN ORAL HISTORY COLLECTION OF COVID-19 FRONTLINE WORKERS

You're invited to help us tell the story.

The Library of Congress is partnering with StoryCorps to record and archive stories of COVID-19 frontline workers. Our goal is to to tell a more diverse and comprehensive account of the pandemic as told by the people who lived through it. We invite you to take

HOW DOES IT WORK?

We'll host you and a recording partner for a 40 minute conversation about your Covid-19 experiences. A StoryCorps Facilitator is with you every step of the way. With your permission, conversations are archived at the Library of Congress's Covid-19 History Project. WHO DO I RECORD WITH?

Someone you care about and feel comfortable talking with. This could be a spouse, a friend, a mentor etc.

WHAT DO I TALK ABOUT?

There's no wrong way to have a StoryCorps Conversation of the session is meant to be authentic, and unscripted. We'll provide you a list of questions to inspire your conversation, like:

- •When did you first realize the pandemic would radically change the world and/your way of life? Do any movements stick out in your memory as "peak pandemic?"
- •Who did you turn to for support during that time?

Ultimately, however, what you talk about during your ecording is completely up to you.

Everyone is invited to tell their Covid-19 story but we are particularly interested in hearing from frontline workers,

medical professionals, emergency service workers,
"essential workers", and people who stepped into
unexpected roles during the pandemic.

Access 4 All is tackling digital inequity head-on with a range of innovative programs. In an interview with Maiten Mowreader-Utreras, she shared insights into how the initiative addresses these challenges. The Access 4 All team provides one-on-one tech support for tasks like password resets and other basic technical challenges in nine different library locations in the City of San Diego. They even operate a helpline for additional assistance.

A key focus of Access 4 All is affordability and accessibility. Many San Diegans struggle with the cost of internet or lack the resources to purchase computers. The program addresses this by connecting individuals to low-cost internet plans and affordable computer options. By offering personalized support and additional resources, Access 4 All is helping residents holistically overcome barriers to digital access.

Beyond providing access, the program emphasizes the importance of digital skills. Through partnerships with other organizations, like Computer2Kids, and public Wi-Fi available at over 300 locations across the City of San Diego, Access 4 All ensures that residents not only have devices and internet but also know how to use them effectively. This comprehensive approach recognizes that digital equity requires addressing skills, devices, and connectivity together.

Access 4 All is now conducting a deep-dive analysis to map gaps in digital access citywide, including in the Promise Zone. Focus groups, outreach surveys, and collaborative input from community partners will shape the Broadband Master Plan that prioritizes equity and informed action. Maiten notes that this effort is vital, as assumptions alone cannot address these challenges - facts and data are critical to building sustainable solutions.

SAN DIEGO PROMISE ZONE

OVERVIEW



In 2016, the San Diego Promise Zone became one of 22 federally designated Promise Zones in the United States and one of only four in California. The San Diego Promise Zone covers a 6.4-square-mile targeted area with more than 80,000 residents that spans East Village and Barrio Logan east to Encanto. It is home to the City's most culturally rich and ethnically diverse neighborhoods, but also some of the most under-resourced communities.

Through the <u>Promise Zone initiative</u>, community-based organizations, direct service providers, residents, and business owners work with government agencies to enhance collective impact, streamline resources, and deliver comprehensive support.

Between 2016 and 2022, the unemployment rate decreased from 14% to 10%, and the poverty rate fell from 35% to 20% (ACS, 2016-22). We recognize there are many factors that contribute to these numbers. We do know that in the 8 years since the designation, targeted efforts from the City and CBOs have supported improvement in these areas; However, we recognize there is still plenty of work to do to continue advocating for our Promise Zone residents.
