



### ALL KIDS PLAY

The average family now spends almost \$900 a year per youth athlete on sports.1 At such a high cost, low income families are being left behind. In fact, only 23% of kids ages 6-12 from families making less than \$25,000 per year played a sport on a regular basis in 2019 compared to 34% in 2012. By comparison, 43% of kids from households making \$100,000 or more played sports in 2019.2

- Game Day Snacks: Serve crowd-pleasers like chicken wings, nachos, sliders, and pigs in a blanket.
- Build-Your-Own Stations: Set up a DIY taco, burger, or hot dog bar with all the fixings.
- Football-Themed Treats: Decorate cupcakes or cookies to look like footballs.
- Drinks Station: Offer a mix of juices, sodas, and other favorites . Include a drink named after each team for extra fun


**All Kids Play** provides funding to families and communities who lack the resources to pay for youth sports. Grants are available to qualifying families with kids in grade K-12 and not-for-profit community-based recreational sports organizations in low income areas on a need and first-come, first served basis as funds are available. Individual grants can be used for registration, equipment and other associated fees for sports classes, recreational leagues, and travel sports. 

### Include a profile picture

This will help increase your credibility. Plus, members with a profile picture receive up to 2X more profile views.

You can add a background image as well for another visual element.



### Add your work experience, school, and any other relevant certifications or experience such as volunteering

In this way, LinkedIn acts a lot like a resume. You can give an overview of your career journey, which LinkedIn lays out in a timeline.

For work experience and other activities or projects you've done, you can include descriptions of your responsibilities and what you achieved, similar to on a resume.

### Add a headline under your name

Using keywords in your headline is critical for others to search for and find your profile. Instead of a job title, emphasize your target job(s) or industries, or unique credentials. You can separate multiple titles with a vertical line.

### Add a summary about yourself



This is a place to summarize yourself: what you are all about, where you are now, and perhaps where you aspire to be in your career.

### List your relevant skills

LinkedIn already has a list of skills, so you can scroll through and pick which ones apply to each role you've held. You can choose all the different experiences a skill applies to, as oftentimes it carries over to multiple!



Tip: Look at other sample LinkedIn profiles for some examples of how they formatted their profile!

### **Is LinkedIn really that** important?

Yes, and here's why: LinkedIn allows you to network! Building a professional network is super important because connections make it way easier to get recognized for a job. Plus, 87% of employers use LinkedIn when evaluating a candidate for a job.







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### **Roadblocks to Jobs:**




- Education & Job Training: Limited access to job skill programs makes it harder to find work.
   Example: Some schools lack career resources.
- Transportation: Without reliable transport, getting to interviews or jobs is tough.
   Example: Public transit unavailable.
- Career Connections: Without mentors or networks, finding job opportunities is harder.
   Example: Lack of industry connections.
- Financial Barriers: Money struggles can prevent you from focusing on work or training.
  - Example: Housing issues.
- Job Skills: You may not have learned key skills like resume writing or interview prep.
  - **Example:** Dressing or acting professionally.

### The Struggle is Real:

- Disconnected youth are those who are not currently in school or employed, often facing challenges like economic instability, lack of support systems, and limited job readiness. In San Diego, this group represents a significant portion of the population, and overcoming the barriers they face is crucial to empowering the next generation.
- According to the San Diego Workforce Partnership, over 40,000 youth in the region are considered disconnected, impacting their long-term potential for success. (Learn More Here)
- Addressing these barriers is key for both youth and San Diego's economy. Providing job access and support helps reduce unemployment, reliance on social services, and builds a stronger workforce. (Learn More Here)

## DIGITAL FOOTPRINT ECHNOLOGY

### What is it?

A digital footprint is the unique trace of data that each user leaves behind while using the internet. All the data accumulated from your social media posts, emails, search engines and more all make up your unique digital footprint



### What for?

A digital footprint is important because it shapes your online reputation, influences opportunities, and impacts privacy and security. It reflects your personal and professional image, with long-term consequences since online content is often permanent. A positive footprint can open doors to education and career opportunities, while a negative one can harm relationships and prospects. Managing your footprint responsibly enhances security, prevents oversharing, and encourages ethical behavior, allowing you to showcase skills, connect with others, and protect your personal data.

### How?

- Active footprint: Information you intentionally share online, like posts or comments.
- Consider the long-term impact of posts—what you share may stay online forever.
- Avoid oversharing personal information (e.g., address, travel plans).
- Post thoughtful, professional, and positive content.
- Regularly review and delete old posts that no longer reflect who you are.

### **Mental Health Tips**

- 1. Curate Your Feed
- Follow accounts that inspire, educate, or bring positivity.
- Unfollow or mute accounts that make you feel stressed, inadequate, or unhappy.
- 2. Set Time Limits
- Use app timers to manage the amount of time spent on social platforms daily.
- Avoid excessive scrolling, especially before bedtime.
- 3. Engage Mindfully
  - Limit passive consumption of content.
- Be intentional by interacting positively and engaging with supportive communities.
- 4. Take Regular Breaks
- Step away from social media periodically to recharge.
- Consider taking a "digital detox" for a few days or even • weeks.

### Security tips

- Avoid sharing sensitive personal information like your address, phone number, or financial details.
- Avoid clicking on suspicious links or attachments, even from known contacts.
- Check for unusual activity, like unauthorized logins or posts you didn't make.
- Enable Two-Factor Authentication (2FA): Add an extra layer of security by requiring a second form of verification.

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### Did you know?

### In San Diego County:

- Black youth in San Diego are incarcerated 13 times more frequently than white youth.
- Latino youth are 3 times more likely to be in custody than white youth.

Youth Empowerment provides:

- Intervention (youth in-school and afterschool programs: mentorship, socialemotional development, career exploration facilitated by those who have had similar experiences)
- Reentry programs (case management, guidance, resources, help with employment and personal development, etc.)
- Parent/Guardian classes (aimed at parents helping to connect with/understand their children)

### SAN DIEGO YOUTH SERVICES

- Community Assessment Team (CAT) provides individualized case management to connect youth at risk of juvenile involvement with resources.
- Alternatives to Detention (ATD) offer an alternative to an institutional setting. Cool beds offer a place to "cool off" during a stressful or challenging time.
- CHOICE is a program that provides guidance for youth on probation. It also includes an after-school rehabilitative program.

Programs for prevention, supporting youth during incarceration, and reentry assistance after release.

- STRIVE Future LEAP helps justiceimpacted young adults develop life and job skills so they can become employed.
- Youth Garden is an 8 week program of hands-on urban farming, nutrition classes, and workforce training. Participants earn a weekly stipend!





Community Wraparound provides trauma-informed mentoring services for gang-involved youth, facilitated by community members with lived experience.

Create an account, sync with your application, and update your school choice. If you change schools, remember to update your <u>WebGrants</u> portal.
