

DURING MY FIRST TERM, I secured wins across the most urgent policy areas for my constituents and focused on addressing District 7's most critical issues. Read on to have a look at some of my proudest, first-term achievements as your City Councilmember.

KEEPING SAN DIEGO — FAMILIES SAFE —

In my first term as City Councilmember, I prioritized public safety and spearheaded multiple efforts to build a safer San Diego.



After a wave of disturbing hate-filled flyers were littered throughout District 7 neighborhoods and broader San Diego, I vowed to explore actionable methods to protect our communities from targeted and threatening attacks. Our initial policy research led to a partnership with

Assemblymember Chris Ward, which in turn led to the creation of, advocacy for, and ultimate codification of **AB 3024**, **the Stop Hate Littering Act.** By strengthening the Ralph Civil Rights Act of 1976 to include the distribution of hateful materials on private property with the intent to terrorize, AB 3024 created an enforcement mechanism to deter and punish hate littering. San Diego is no place for hate; we must stay vigilant to prevent hate from taking hold.

The San Diego Police Department is one of the largest in the country, serving 1.41 million residents and approximately 32 million annual tourists across 372.4 square miles in the City of San Diego. I believe that it is crucial to support their difficult jobs to both properly care for current officers and improve recruitment.

I was an outspoken supporter of Smart Streetlights, a technology particularly critical for swift action on serious crimes. You might have seen several news stories this year about Smart Streetlights being utilized to apprehend suspects in crimes such as attempted kidnappings and armed robberies. As of October 2024, the technology had already contributed to **229 criminal cases** in 2024 and resulted in **166 arrests**.

San Diego is not only the secondsafest big city in the United States,
but we do it for far less money than
many other big cities. Our police
department's success could not be
possible without the support of the
Council and the public, Giving the
police department the tools to
prevent and solve crimes, like Smart
Streetlights and the ability to
collaborate with State and Federal
task forces, helps ensure that violent
crime remains far lower than
San Francisco and Los Angeles.

San Diego's future depends upon what we do here and now—and that means investing in the lives of our youngest residents.

One of my proudest first-term achievements was the establishment of the Office of Child and Youth Success. This department--the first of its kind at the City--is dedicated to education and career pathing, workforce development, youth empowerment, and child poverty mitigation.

From the moment I took office, I've been committed to expanding access to quality and affordable childcare. I **vocally supported Measure H,** which allows City facilities to be leased to childcare providers to address our current deficit of affordable, quality childcare options in San Diego. I also championed a policy to **double** the City of San Diego's paid parental leave from **4 weeks to 8 weeks** and make it easier for mothers to access disability benefits, helping us recruit and retain talented workers. Since its implementation, our new paid parental leave structure allotted new parents at the City of San Diego:

AFFORDABLE HOUSING

Every San Diegan deserves a happy and healthy place to live.

Within my first term, District 7 delivered not just affordable housing, but entire communities designed to uplift our most vulnerable neighbors. In Linda Vista, the Puesta del Sol complex and the Levant Senior Cottages opened 185 affordable, new units for seniors. In Grantville, ShoreLINE boasts 124 affordable rental units next to transit. These are only two of multiple new housing developments in D7.





REPAVING YOUR ROADS

Every San Diegan deserves smooth, well-maintained streets to drive on.

I'm incredibly proud that, in the last four years, some of District 7's **most arterial roads were repaved**: Comstock Street, Genesee Avenue, Santo Road, Friars Road, Navajo Road, Tierrasanta Boulevard, Aero Drive and many more.

Let's not forget the **unprecedented number** of side streets, cul-desacs, and residential roads that received repair, too. These roads are not just important to District 7 residents, but also to the entire City of San Diego; they connect us to work, family, friends, and events.

DRIVING POLICY IN 2024

My job on the City Council dais and in the community is to drive policy that **brings wins back to District 7.** With this guiding principle, my team and I accomplished much to be proud of in 2024.

BUDGETWINS

In the face of tough budgetary times, our City Council and Mayor prioritized the needs most critical to San Diegans.

I fought for, and won, **critical investments in District 7**, including \$4.7 million for the flagship San Carlos Library, important Parks and Recreation programming such as Linda Vista Parks After Dark, targeted homelessness services in the San Diego Riverbed, and sweeping investments in the departments responsible for City of San Diego infrastructure.

THIS YEAR...

I drafted a resolution to lead the City Council's support for Prop 1, a \$6.38 billion bond dedicated to creating more than 11,000 treatment beds in California. Prop 1 passed--an enormous asset in the City Council's efforts to combat homelessness and bolster substance abuse and behavioral health treatment options.



In February 2024, the first citywide Project Labor Agreement (PLA) was signed into law. It went into effect in July 2024. **PLAs protect taxpayers** by eliminating costly delays, creating quality local jobs, and making sure that projects are done on time and on budget.



ONE JOB SHOULD BE ENOUGH

I also joined Unite Here Local 30, which represents over 7,500 hotel, food service, airport, and gaming workers, and Service Employees International United (SEIU), which represents members in the healthcare, public sector, and property services industries, on picket lines this year. **San Diego's working class deserves livable wages** that cover basic expenses like housing, transportation and groceries.





I EXPLORED COMMON-SENSE SOLUTIONS TO BIG PROBLEMS

In July, the City Council adopted a series of changes to the Land Development Codes (LDC), including common-sense changes I championed that lowered barriers to build more behavioral health facilities across San Diego. By streamlining the permitting process for behavioral health facilities, we **boosted healthcare providers'** capacity to deliver more efficient and comprehensive care to San Diegans.





Thanks to these changes, Father Joes Villages announced its new detox and sober living facility. **This facility will offer 45 Medi-Cal eligible detox beds—an incredible 2250% increase** from the mere *two* beds that were available in the City of San Diego. This is a shining example of what we can do when we work together to reduce barriers and chip away at our most complex issues. Behavioral health issues and substance use disorder impact all of us. This is an enormous step toward delivering compassionate care to our most vulnerable neighbors.

2025 LOOKING AHEAD

OWNERSHIP

Take ownership of the City of San Diego's strengths--such as public safety, infrastructure, and programming--and hold the County of San Diego accountable to its responsibilities.

TRUTH

Prioritize transparency and candor in discussions about the City of San Diego's past shortfalls and solutions for our most urgent issues.

FOCUS

Bring policy and infrastructure wins back to District 7 through collaborative discussions and informed decisions at City Council.











Allied Gardens

Key Events



February 10, 2024: I was honored to be joined by Director of Parks and Recreation, Andy Field, Gerhard Oertelt, Founder of Beyond Leashes, and the Allied Gardens community to celebrate the grand opening of the Allied Gardens Dog Park. While I was running to be Councilmember, Gerhard contacted me directly to communicate that the Navajo Community deserved a space for our beloved four-legged family members to socialize, run, exercise, and have fun. Three years and plenty of hard work later, we gave the community the first city-funded dog park in District 7.



June 26, 2024: I was incredibly excited to learn that the Allied Gardens Little League Red Sox won their District Championship off of a grand slam. I had the pleasure of inviting them to City Hall for a tour and the presentation of a proclamation that declared June 9, 2024 "Allied Gardens Red Sox Champions Day" in the City of San Diego.



July 31, 2024: Kelly Wood served a distinguished career in the City of San Diego Parks and Recreation Department for 36 years. In July, Kelly officially retired and left behind a legacy of exemplary leadership, impressive dedication and unyielding commitment to public service. I attended the retirement celebration, organized by residents and fellow Parks and Recreation staff, to present Kelly with a proclamation that declared July 31, 2024 "Kelly Wood Day" in the City of San Diego.

Del Cerro Key Events

July 24, 2024: Last summer, on the cusp of fire season, I visited San Diego Fire Department's Station 31 in Del Cerro to discuss fire prevention and emergency plan strategies with Battalion Chief Shimoguchi and Assistant Fire Marshal Dan Hypes. I was pleased to learn that San Diego Fire is consistently engaging with new fire research to determine best strategies for mitigation. I was also thankful for the opportunity to share their advice with District 7 residents, many of whom live in areas with increased fire risk.

August 20, 2024: I had the opportunity to tour the Alvarado Water Treatment Plant, which supplies drinking water to much of central San Diego, including many residents of District 7. The Alvarado Plant, located next to Lake Murray, has a capacity of 120 million gallons of treated water per day and houses San Diego's Water Quality Laboratory, where our water is routinely tested to ensure it remains safe and clean for all.

December 12, 2024: Members of the Del Cerro community reached out to me regarding unsafe activity happening in Pasatiempo Open Space Park. My staff and I worked with Parks and Recreation Open Space Division, the City Attorney's Office, Allied Gardens Rec. Council, and the community to legislate a curfew. The signs were installed in December and, thanks to our action and the advocacy of community groups like Friends of Del Cerro, residents have reported a decrease in the unsafe activity.











Grantville Key Events

January 25, 2024: I joined the San Diego River Park Foundation for their Point In Time Count along the riverbed in Grantville. The Point In Time is a nationwide, annual census of the country's homeless population. We canvassed the riverbeds just after the January storm, which caused the river to swell several feet and endangered the lives of those who were living along the river at that time. Our volunteer group both captured critical data about the folks living along the riverbed and connected them to housing and wraparound services.

February 24, 2024: I hosted my first Coffee with Campillo event at S3 Coffee Bar in Grantville. Thanks to S3 Coffee Bar, who provided the coffee, and to the participants, who provided the conversation!

April 30, 2024: Affordable housing, especially within proximity to public transportation, is one of my key priorities for our District and the City of San Diego as a whole. I was joined by MTS Board Chair Stephen Whitburn, Mayor Todd Gloria, and President of Affirmed Housing Jimmy Silverwood to celebrate the grand opening of ShoreLINE, an affordable community with apartment units, a park for children, a recreation center, and services all built to support a happy and healthy community in Grantville.

Linda Vista Key Events

April 27, 2024: The Linda Vista Multicultural Fair is an annual event loved by not only Linda Vista, but also the entire San Diego region. It's a full day dedicated to the celebration of San Diego's diversity and cultural heritage. This year, I surprised longtime Linda Vista resident Janet Kaye with a proclamation declaring Saturday, April 27, 2024 "Janet Kaye Day". Janet puts her heart and soul into this event and countless other personal efforts to better her community. I was grateful for the opportunity to honor her and to enjoy this day with the rest of the community. I look forward to next year, which will be Linda Vista Multicultural Fair's 40th anniversary!

May 25, 2024: The late Howard Wayne, who passed away in November of 2023, grew up in San Diego and served as a Deputy Attorney General, State Assemblymember, and Linda Vista Planning Group Chair. In honor of his life and contributions, and with the help of many community members, I secured the unanimous approval of City Council to install an honorary street name on the 1100 block of Morena Boulevard. Members of the Wayne family and others joined me to reveal the sign.

November 15, 2024: Thanks to the generosity of San Diego Carpenters Local 619 and the organizational power of Bayside Community Center, we were able to deliver 100 turkeys, 2,173 pounds of produce, and 152 bags of nonperishable food to 152 families in Linda Vista.









Mission Valley Key Events

January 2024: My Community
Representative for Mission Valley, Miles, and
I reached out to the Transportation
Department to urge a cleanup of the median
that divides Friars Road. I'm proud to support
efforts that keep the City's roadways and
public spaces as well-maintained as possible!

Normal Heights

March 19, 2024: The City Council unanimously voted to spend \$3.7 million from the Encampment Resolution Funding Program, a grant from the California Interagency Council on Homelessness, on addressing encampments along the San Diego riverbed. One of the two areas specifically designated for intensive outreach is the section of Riverbed along Interstate 8 in Mission Valley. This \$3.7 million will be spent on rapid rehousing, operating housing subsidies, street outreach, prevention and shelter diversion, interim sheltering, and more. This project aims to transition approximately 168 individuals experiencing homelessness into permanent or other longterm housing and service others.

June 1, 2024: I had the privilege of attending an HOA meeting in Mission Valley, hosted by Rancho Mission Villas HOA, which brought together homeowners in the Grantville and Mission Valley communities to discuss how our City can best serve their needs. We addressed a range of topics from streets to parks and neighborhood infrastructure.

San Carlos Key Events

January 13, 2024: This year, we honored the San Carlos Library turning 50 years old, an anniversary that gave us the opportunity to reflect on the importance of libraries as places for community gathering, learning, and programming that contributes to our collective wellbeing. Big thanks to the Friends of the San Carlos Library and David Ege for bringing us together to celebrate the San Carlos Library.

February 13, 2024: As a former baseball player and big fan of the game, I always enjoy attending District 7 Little League opening day ceremonies. It was a pleasure to be on hand for San Carlos Little League's Opening Day. I presented two proclamations: one to honor Opening Day, and another to honor Little League President Sheila Gigante for her decade of service to the community.

September 21, 2024: In September, I hosted a free bulk trash drop-off event, in partnership with EDCO, at the future lot of the new San Carlos Library. We filled six 40-yard containers to the brim by welcoming almost 100 different families through. My staff and I also enjoyed the chance to chat with residents who came by to drop their waste off.













Serra Mesa Key Events

March 5, 2024: Meals on Wheels San Diego serves nearly 4,500 seniors in San Diego County, many of whom reside in District 7. During Meals on Wheels' Champions Week, an annual event aimed at increasing public awareness of their services, two of my staff members joined a route through Serra Mesa. They enjoyed meeting "the regulars," such as Margaret (seen to the left), and chatting with Meals on Wheels staff about the importance of their roles in the lives of our senior population.

April 2024: In April, both Aero Drive and Gramercy Drive received repaving. Gramercy, in particular, had protected bike lanes installed--a great benefit to the students of surrounding schools!

May 9, 2024: In early 2024, my Community Representative, Miles, attended the grand opening of TBH Auto Care. In May, I swung by to chat with the owner, Ben Hart, about his experience building a small business from the ground up. Ben graduated from Cuyamaca College with a degree in Automotive Technology after experiencing homelessness; he is a shining example of hard work and well-deserved success. TBH, which stands for "To Be Honest," reflects Ben's mission to change his industry through honest and reliable car maintenance services.

Tierrasanta Key Events

May 18, 2024: In May, my staff and I walked in the 35th Tierrasanta Day Patriot Day Parade. This annual celebration of Armed Forces Day, chock-full of Tierrasanta community groups and families, is always a joy to participate in. Many thanks to the Tierrasanta Foundation, the Kiwanis Club of Tierrasanta, the Tierrasanta Junior Women's Club, the Tierrasanta Community Council, Newbreak Church, and Tierrasanta Lutheran Church for organizing this well-loved event for the community.

September 21, 2024: Tierrasanta community members came together for the once-in-a-lifetime celebration of 9/21/24 Day. The event, funded and organized by Tierrasanta businesses and organizations, featured live music, food, kids' activities, and a 92124's Got Talent show. My staff tabled at the event and enjoyed sharing the excitement with Tierrasanta residents. I'm proud to have recommended \$4,000 in ACCF funding to Tierrasanta Foundation for this event.

November 23, 2024: In November, I invited Tierrasanta residents to do some pre-holiday cleaning with a free bulk trash drop-off event. My staff and I manned six 40-yard dumpsters, which residents filled within two hours. We were able to serve over 150 individual families. It was great to chat with the folks who came through!









Mission Trails Regional Park Key Events

March 23, 2024: I presented Dorothy
Leonard, the lead steward behind the work to
acquire Cowles Mountain and establish
Mission Trails Regional Park, with a
proclamation honoring her service. She
moved out of state to be closer to family in
June, but her knowledge of the park, her
contributions and love for the park will always
be a part of Mission Trails.

July 3, 2024: The City of San Diego's Open Space Division hit an exciting milestone in July: the donation of 55 additional acres of Mission Trails Regional Park space to San Diego. Thank you to the Mission Trails Regional Park Foundation for this generous land donation, which is part of our vision to significantly expand San Diego's open spaces and safeguard vulnerable species.

December 11, 2024: Dredging of the Old Mission Dam is finished! By dredging the dam, we not only made it safer but also improved water quality by removing excess sediment, debris, and pollutants, creating a healthier environment for aquatic life. It also preserved a historical landmark built in 1803 by the Kumeyaay. I was proud to secure the funds for this much-needed project.

Each year, City Councilmembers are provided the opportunity to recommend funding for local non-profit organizations through two programs: Community Projects, Programs, and Services (CPPS) Funding and Arts, Culture, and Community Festivals (ACCF) Funding. Each Council Office was allotted \$150,000.

This year, we received **536 applications** with a total of **\$9.7 million** in requests across both programs. To the right is a breakdown of how I recommended the \$150,000 be distributed, much of which went directly back to District 7 organizations and events.

\$59,000

to arts, culture, community festivals and events like Tierrasanta Oktoberfest and the Linda Vista Multicultural Fair.

\$53,000

to economic and community development like workforce development for disadvantaged communities and meal delivery services.

\$38,000

to educational and outdoor programming like Trail
