- The private sector


This presentation outlines a **Quadrant Approach** to wildfire resilience to:

 - Engage stakeholders and justify investments
 - Adapt wildfire resilience efforts for the future

- Zoning & land-use planning Reducing fire risk in high-hazard areas
- Emergency communication systems Enhancing real-time alerts & evacuation strategies
- Post-fire recovery Addressing flood/landslide risks & long-term restoration
- Climate adaptation measures Strengthening infrastructure to withstand wildfire impacts

Community Preparedness

- Education & training Public awareness campaigns & evacuation drills
