





Women's History Month

March is Women's History Month, a time to recognize and honor their contributions. Women have shattered barriers, pioneered new fields, and led movements for progress. Here are a few trailblazers whose legacies continue to inspire.



Women Who Changed the World




- Sojourner Truth (1797–1883)
 - Former enslaved woman, abolitionist, and famous for her "Ain't I a Woman?" speech advocating for Black women's rights.
- Ida B. Wells (1862-1931)
 - Journalist and activist who fought against lynching and co-founded the NAACP.
- Rosa Parks (1913-2005)
 - Civil rights icon who refused to give up her seat on a segregated bus.
- Fannie Lou Hamer (1917–1977)
 - Voting rights activist and leader in the Mississippi Freedom Democratic Party.
- Dolores Huerta (1930-Present)
 - Latina labor rights activist and co-founder of the United Farm Workers.
- Angela Davis (1944-Present)
 - Activist, author, and scholar who fought for racial and prison reform.



Innovators in STEM & Medicine

- Henrietta Lacks (1920–1951)
 - o Her cells (HeLa cells) revolutionized medical research, though taken without consent.
- Dr. Patricia Bath (1942-2019)
 - Invented laser cataract surgery, the first Black female doctor to receive a medical patent.
- Katherine Johnson (1918–2020)
 - NASA mathematician who helped send the first Americans into space.
- Dr. Kizzmekia Corbett (1986-Present)
 - o A pioneering viral immunologist whose research in mRNA vaccine technology has helped save millions of lives and paved the way for future advancements.

Champions in Sports

- Wilma Rudolph (1940-1994)
 - First American woman to win three gold medals in track and field at a single Olympics, inspiring generations of athletes.
- Serena Williams (1981-Present)
 - o Considered one of the greatest tennis players of all time.
- Simone Biles (1997-Present)
 - Most decorated gymnast in history. Redefining the sport with her record-breaking performances, and advocacy for mental health
- Megan Rapinoe (1985-Present)
 - Soccer star and advocate for gender equality.

Pioneers in Business & the Arts

- Madam C.I. Walker (1867–1919)
 - First Black female millionaire created a haircare empire that empowered Black women through entrepreneurship and financial independence.
- Oprah Winfrey (1954–Present)
 - o Media mogul, philanthropist, and the first Black female billionaire.
- Frida Kahlo (1907-1954)
 - A groundbreaking Mexican artist and feminist icon, Explored themes of identity, and pain, leaving a lasting mark on the art world.
- Toni Morrison (1931-2019)
 - o Nobel Prize-winning author of Beloved and The Bluest Eye.



Know Your Rights: Immigrants' Rights Guaranteed by the Constitution



→ Different Scenarios

- ACLU: Know Your Rights
- This resource lists different scenarios you may find yourself in as an immigrant, what your rights are, and how you can respond.
- Look under each scenario for translations to other languages!

→ Know Your Rights Printable Cards

- Printable red cards in 19 different languages
- These cards have a script of what to say to police, ICE, or Border Patrol when they are questioning your immigration status.
- There are also many printable cards online; if you search for "know your rights cards" you can easily find them.




 A safe space for LGBTQ+ youth to connect, grow, and access support, while advocating for youth-focused policies.


