SD Promise Zone WORKING GROUP UPDATES

Jobs and Education

During the February Jobs & Education Working Group meeting, Donika Moreno, SDPZ AmeriCorps VISTA Operations Associate, presented about the SDPZ 2025 Youth-Led Career Expo. She shared how partner organizations can contribute to the Career Expo, such as sponsoring, volunteering, being a vendor or bringing a group of students. Students from Lincoln High School were able to join the meeting to share their insights to help guide planning. Partners had the opportunity to discuss how their organization can contribute and further collaborate in breakout rooms. Economic Activity

The February Economic Activity meeting was centered around identifying programs that could assist local small businesses by providing new opportunities and assistance. To that end, we heard a presentation from the CA Jobs First initiative on the \$9 million in funding they received to boost San Diego area businesses that operate in five key areas: Agriculture, Industry & Manufacturing, Arts & Culture, Tourism and Life Sciences. The second presentation from the City of San Diego's Small Business Advisory Board focused on assisting small businesses by amplifying their voices and transmitting their concerns to City policymakers. Following the presentation, participants discussed how they could best inform small business owners about these organizations and the programs they provide.

Healthy Communities

The February Healthy Communities meeting consisted of an in-depth overview of the Get-It-Done app, including how to utilize it and data regarding current usage. The Get-It-Done app connects with 11 City departments, each with its own set of priorities. All reports are checked by a human intake team, and no report goes unaddressed for more than a few minutes. One highlight of the presentation was that satisfaction scores within the app had improved in several categories, including Graffiti Abatement (91) and Illegal Dumping (78). At the conclusion of the presentation, partners inquired about the possibility of additional Get-It-Done presentations at other community meetings and potential improvements to the app, such as an appeals process. Both requests are under consideration.

Housing Affordability

The Housing Affordability Working Group met on Jan. 8, 2025, and heard a presentation by Julie Corrales from Tierras Indigenas Community Land Trust (TICLT). The presentation included the origins of TICLT as well as the hard work done by community members to get it off the ground. Julie provided information about the tenants and members of the community that will be active in the TICLT as well as different workshops and programs designed to educate community members. The discussion after this presentation focused on educating people and organizations in the Promise Zone about land trust models and the benefits they provide. San Diego Promise Zone



In 2016, the San Diego Promise Zone (SDP2) became one of 22 federally designated Promise Zones in the U.S. and one of only four in California. Spanning 6.4 square miles, the SDP2 is home to over 80,000 residents in the City's most culturally rich and ethnically diverse neighborhoods, as well as some of its most under-resourced communities.



COMMUNITY SPOTLIGHT Raquel Aparicio

Raquel Aparicio is the Director of Student Outreach and Engagement at the University of California, San Diego. In this inaugural role, she leads efforts to advance advocacy, education and reporting for higher education pipeline-building while ensuring the coordination of diverse outreach initiatives. Born and raised in Nicaragua, Raquel was shaped by the perseverance and dedication of her mother, Silvia Elena. Teachers who invested in her growth ignited her passion for education, inspiring her to build a career dedicated to supporting students. Facing her challenges as an immigrant and first-generation student, she became committed to removing barriers for underserved communities.



Her journey in higher education began in admissions at Point Loma Nazarene University and San Diego Mesa College, where she worked to create equitable student opportunities. Raquel joined The Governor's Office of Business and Economic Development (GO-Biz) during a brief transition from academia, where she played a key role in advancing a bottom-up approach to economic development. She worked to bridge connections across federal, state and local government, economic development agencies, higher education institutions, K-12 districts, chambers of commerce and industry leaders—ensuring that economic initiatives were informed by and responsive to community needs. Recognizing the critical role education plays in economic mobility, she brought issues of educational access into the conversations of the Promise Zone's Economic Activity and Jobs and Education working groups. This experience reaffirmed her mission, leading her back to higher education in 2023. She now continues her work at UC San Diego while serving as Co-Chair of the Promise Zone's Jobs and Education Working Group, which is hosting a Career Expo on March 18.

Raquel is one of our amazing partners spotlighted for the March Newsletter, especially as we recognize Women's History Month and direct attention to the achievements and accomplishments of women. One of Raquel's role models is her mother, Silvia, who took her first flight to the United States alone with four young children. Her mother's courage and unconditional love stuck with Raquel, and she continues to incorporate these qualities wherever she goes.

City Spotlight Urban Forestry Program

The **Urban Forestry Program**, part of San Diego's Transportation Department, is dedicated to enhancing community livability and sustainability by planting, protecting, promoting and maintaining trees. Urban Forestry **manages over 250,000 street trees citywide**, aiming to cultivate a world-class urban forest.

The Urban Forestry Program collaborates with the Parks and Recreation Department to coordinate tree planting initiatives and address public requests submitted through the Get It Done app. Through the Trees for Communities project, they partner with local nonprofits like Tree San Diego and the Logan Heights Community Development Corporation to provide tree stewardship training to educate residents on proper planting and care techniques. Additionally, Urban Forestry has teamed up with Casa Familiar for door-to-door outreach in San Ysidro, promoting urban forestry efforts. Regular collaborations with Tree San Diego also include organizing events such as Arbor Day and Kate Sessions Day.

In the upcoming months, the Urban Forestry Program has several events planned, including a community forum at Bay Terrace Community and Senior Center that is a part of the Ready, Set, Grow San Diego initiative. The forum focused on community engagement in urban forestry efforts. Finally, the **City's Annual Arbor Day Tree Planting** is set for **Friday, April 25**, **at Colina Del Sol Park**. This event invites volunteers to participate in enhancing the local tree canopy through tree planting. Community members interested in participating can find details and registration information on the Urban Forestry Program's Events Calendar. This resource provides updates on upcoming events and opportunities to get involved.

The City's 2024 Arbor Day event took place in Memorial Community Park and nearby streets, where **over 250 volunteers planted more than 100 trees**. Through the Trees for Communities project, the Urban Forestry Program has planted over 1,500 trees in the San Diego Promise Zone, with each tree receiving weekly watering, **totaling 33,600 waterings since April 2024**. The program also secured a \$10 million U.S. Forest Service grant, titled "Ready, Set, Grow San Diego," which covers areas within Lincoln Park and Encanto. This funding will support planting, watering and maintaining thousands of trees, as well as redesigning sidewalks to better accommodate existing trees, continuing to enhance the urban canopy and community green spaces.


What's the change?

ABOUT THE PROMISE ZONE

In 2016, the San Diego Promise Zone became one of 22 federally designated Promise Zones in the United States and one of only four in California. The San Diego Promise Zone covers a 6.4-square-mile targeted area with more than 80,000 residents that spans East Village and Barrio Logan east to Encanto. It is home to the City's most culturally rich and ethnically diverse neighborhoods but also some of the most under-resourced communities.

Through the <u>Promise Zone initiative</u>, community-based organizations, direct service providers, residents and business owners work with government agencies to enhance collective impact, streamline resources and deliver comprehensive support. Between 2016 and 2022, the unemployment rate decreased from 14% to 10%, and the poverty rate fell from 35% to 20% (ACS, 2016-22). We recognize there are many factors that contribute to these numbers. We do know that in the eight years since the designation, targeted efforts from the City and CBOs have supported improvement in these areas; however, we recognize there is still plenty of work to do to continue advocating for our Promise Zone residents.
