<p>7 Advanced Water Treatment Demonstration Project: The Water Department was requested to provide a cost estimate for the Advanced Water Treatment Demonstration Project, including an energy and economic analysis for all water supply augmentation methods in the Long Range Water Resources Plan, a flow and detention study at the San Vicente Reservoir, and community outreach and education efforts as approved by Council on December 3, 2007. The IBA has received a preliminary list of identified ADA projects for FY 2009. If this project list can be expeditiously scoped and scheduled, it is reasonable to expect that the identified projects could be substantially completed in FY 2009. The IBA has requested that data be provided in FY 2010 final budget documents for the Citywide measures associated with the City's strategic plan.</p>
<p>17 Alcohol Beach Ban: A one-year pilot of the Alcohol Beach Ban approved by Council in November 2007 will expire in January 2009. Given the yearly funding difficulty with the City's annual Winter Shelter, the year-round Shelter Program will need a funding strategy for consistent funding resources. Coordination with the County is also suggested.</p>	<p>Semi-annual Reports to City Council</p>	<p>Ongoing</p>	<p>On December 2, 2008 the City Council heard from the San Diego Housing Commission on a proposed Scope of Services for a Permanent Homeless Facility. At that meeting the Council approved the draft RFP/Scope of Services and asked that a comprehensive homeless policy be brought forward to the Council within 6 months. An RFP was issued on April 3, 2009 with the deadline for responses set for June 22, 2009. Staff has indicated that based on the viability of the responses received, staff from the City, CCDC, and the HC would form a selection committee to evaluate proposals, which would later be presented to the LU&H Committee. While no comprehensive homeless policy is planned to come forward, staff has indicated that the RFP is the first step in the goal of addressing the homeless population and serves the purpose of comprehensively addressing the issue of homelessness.</p>

<p>21 CDBG Reforms: During FY 2008, the policies and procedures related to the allocation of CDBG funds were revised, in response to HUD audits. Additional reform efforts are underway, including greater community outreach and involvement, and the development of a comprehensive strategic plan that prioritizes allocations based on community needs and creates performance measurements to make sure funds are utilized in an effective manner. Desired outcomes include a comprehensive database of all City fees and charges, with current and recommended levels of cost recovery, along with an established plan for annual or periodic adjustment as part of the budget process.</p>	<p>Budget & Finance Committee and City Council</p>	<p>Policy Completed/ Implementation In Process</p>	<p>At the February 25th, 2009, meeting of the Budget and Finance Committee, Financial Management presented a proposed General Fund User Fee Policy. The Committee accepted the report and policy and requested that all general fund department fee increases be presented to the B&F Committee before going to Council, and that FM return to the B&F Committee on September 9, 2009 with a draft Comprehensive Fee Study. At Committee, the policy was amended to include a section mandating: "Revisions to the fees shall incorporate savings from efficiency reforms. Departments shall include these efficiency savings in their cost analysis to determine fees." At the March 10, 2009 Council Meeting, the Council voted 5-2 to adopt the policy, with the deletion of the added language, and to include in the section on Annual User Fee Review that "The fee proposals then shall be reviewed by the Budget and Finance Committee with subsequent approval by the City Council." The policy has been implemented through incorporation of \$6.7 million in increased cost recovery fees in the FY 2010 budget.</p>

These pending policies included: a redevelopment debt policy; a CIP prioritization policy; a variable rate debt and derivatives policy; and, if appropriate, an updated Housing Authority Multifamily Mortgage Revenue Bond Program Policy. The Deputy Executive Director of the Redevelopment Agency requested another year (late in FY 2009) to develop/present a redevelopment agency debt policy in light of possible Agency reorganization. The CIP prioritization policy was adopted by the City Council on May 27, 2008. City Council training was held on the use of variable rate debt and derivatives in January 2008; however, a policy has yet to be developed for Council consideration. The Housing Authority Bond Program Policy is expected to be docketed for Budget and Finance Committee discussion early in FY 2009.</p>	<p>Budget & Finance Committee and City Council</p>	<p>Policy Completed</p>	<p>On October 27, 2008, staff provided an annual review of the City's Debt Policy to the City Council. At that meeting, a redevelopment debt policy was anticipated to be completed by the end of FY 2009. The updated Housing Commission's Multifamily Mortgage Revenue Bond Policy was presented to the City Council on September 23, 2008 and has been incorporated into the City's Debt Policy. Revision of the City's 2004 Climate Protection Action Plan will begin in April and will have stakeholder input from a variety of perspectives.
