Cluster Boxes (This background received from the Office of Member of Congress, Susan Davis)

Community Question: How do/would cluster boxes work in your neighborhood?

The Issue: There are proposals in Congress to basically eliminate door-to-door mail delivery and replace it with cluster boxes. This would have to be done at 30 million addresses over the next six years. Currently, postal code requires new home divisions to use cluster boxes but the proposal would require every neighborhood to convert retroactively. Congresswoman Susan Davis wants to get a sense of how your community would feel about such a proposal.

Problems with Cluster Boxes:

- 1. Are unsightly and have a proven record of attracting graffiti, imposing the burden of graffiti removal costs & maintenance on local government
- 2. Are insecure compared to door to door delivery can be robbed easily by popping the postal master key lock
- 3. Block pedestrian, ADA, parking and other access in the public right of way
- 4. Remove the public safety benefit derived from local mail carriers with door to door delivery
- 5. Are incompatible with community character in established neighborhoods, particularly older neighborhoods and historic districts
- 6. Attract traffic and double-parking problems on local streets at residents attempt to access them
- 7. Could cost well-paid mail carrier jobs at the local level, with negative economic impact to a city.
- 8. Dropping door to door delivery may or may not remove a financial burden from the federal government but would definitely place a greater financial burden on our local/city government

Arguments for Cluster Boxes:

-Proponents think they will save USPS money by shrinking the workforce. A recent GAO (Government Accountability Office) study estimates delivery costs could go down by 55% and 80,000 jobs would be eliminated. However, GAO does not have current delivery cost data or data on how much the post office would lose as use would go down. GAO recommends further study.
